Dear Friends and Supporters,

The St. Vincent de Paul Society of Lane County was first recognized as a non-profit in 1955. The 1980s were especially difficult for our local community. Following the collapse of the timber industry, unemployment was high and the economy was especially low--people were desperate. At the time, SVdP didn't have many resources to address these critical issues.

In 2019—nearly 35 years later—our community saw the largest increase in homeless individuals ever. Unlike the 1980s, we were able to respond. Over the past year, SVdP doubled the size of the Dusk to Dawn program, which provides overnight shelter for homeless adults. In January 2020, we increased it by another 25 percent—the program grew from 100 beds per night to more than 250. In January, the SVdP Lindholm Center also provided more than 17,000 meals to homeless individuals.

This degree of community support was not possible 35 years ago. SVdP had the vision to address these difficult issues and to become an anchor non-profit in Lane County. It's taken many years to reach this point, and yet, we recognize that homelessness is not going away. The economic displacement, high rents, and low vacancy rates will continue to make some of our most vulnerable neighbors lose their homes, and perhaps their lives.

SVdP will continue to respond with creative programs including mobile home park restoration, shelter services, and new housing development. With the ongoing support of staff, donors, partners, Board members, and volunteers, we will make strides and assume responsibility for issues that we were unable to address years ago. With your help, we are confident that we will continue growing and do even more to address the needs of our community and the children, families, seniors, veterans, and others who are our neighbors.

Thanks for your support – and for the privilege of serving our community.




